
BOARD MEMBER EMERITUS

Brand New Instructor!

Stephanie Compton, who recently qualified as an Assistant Instructor (CTRAI), is an energetic and talented young woman. She is exactly the kind of horse lover needed to become an ardent proponent of therapeutic riding. We are fortunate to have her on our Joyriders team.

Stephanie was a typical horse-crazy little girl, lucky enough to have a backyard horse. Sunny entered her life when she was twelve, and they were companions for 21 years. They had no interest in competing in horse shows but enjoyed riding around their farm down woodland trails and along the beaches of Savage Harbour. Sunny didn't care where they were going as long as they went FAST.

Stephanie recalls these rides with wonder, yet the important recollection is of the strong bond she felt with Sunny. This companionship, which she sees happen with our riders, is a great gift. "It's more than the lesson or the ride," she says. "They have a wonderful, powerful, four-legged friend. There is something very special about that."

Stephanie became interested in the Joyriders in 2006, just after she completed her BSc in Agriculture at UPEI. While temporarily unemployed, she wanted to give back to society, and the Joyriders was one of the organizations she volunteered with.

"I found my way to the Joyriders because I like spending time with horses, but I stayed because I discovered my relationships with the riders to be inspiring. I felt great after spending time at the barn. There is so much positive energy there. I also enjoyed the structure of the program—grooming and warming up the horses, learning correct horsemanship techniques, observing Kathy Barrett's gentle training and coaching methods."





In 2010, Stephanie began working on the many requirements of CTRAI certification. She says that Kathy's high standards and consistency as a riding instructor and her fairness and consideration as a horse trainer were motivating factors, as were Daphne Davey's vision and energy. "I had never accomplished anything as a rider," she says. "Becoming an Assistant Instructor is probably something I would never have pursued on my own. Kathy nurtured my natural ability to communicate with the riders and through her mentorship nurtured my ability to become an AI."

Stephanie, who had never had formal riding training, took her first real riding lessons as she began her training. “I enjoyed being the riding student,” she says. “It has given me a better perspective of what our riders have accomplished through their lessons.” Certification training involves obtaining a current First Aid/CPR certificate, mentoring hours (with Kathy), completing a prerequisite workbook and lesson plans, practice teaching, student reports, participating in a pre-exam Technical, and the actual exam (hands-on teaching, oral questions and a written exam), which was held at Cavalier Riding Club (a CanTRA centre near Moncton).

Stephanie thanks the entire Program Team for their support and encouragement. She is pleased to be part of that team. “I enjoy being able to provide our riders with the opportunity to connect with a horse in the way that I had the opportunity to be companions with Sunny,” she says. “This is my place in the equestrian world.”

Why is Joyriders such worthwhile work? Stephanie finds it so because, as an able-bodied rider, she took for granted what her body could tell her horse to do and also took for granted how perceptive horses are to people. She sees Joyriders asking their horses to do something—using very modified horsemanship/riding techniques—and the horses are listening, interpreting and following through on the rider’s request. “It’s a beautiful thing to see,” she says. “I’ve seen Joyriders horses connect with our riders in a way that is so profoundly intuitive that it brings tears to my eyes.”

PARA-EQUESTRIAN VIDEOS

In the fall of 2013, our intrepid videographer, David Park (a.k.a. Joyriders president) crouched, well wrapped up, at the far end of the arena to videotape a number of our riders for the Para-Equestrian Video Competition.

Our riders had been practicing the challenging Equitation test for several weeks. As the time for taping drew near, we discovered that costs for entering the national Para-Equestrian Competition had risen substantially since last year, so we offered an in-house option at minimal cost, the videos to be judged by two local horse people, both qualified Equine Canada coaches – I'm sure the first time they had been asked to judge this way!

Janet Fraser has been a program volunteer for several years, but her first contact with the Joyriders was in 1985 when she judged the Dressage Demonstration that we staged during the Charlottetown Pony Club Show. Her involvement with the Charlottetown Pony Club and Horse Trials PEI goes back many years.

Valerie Paton recently retired from the Joyriders board after several years of service, and can sometimes be seen hanging around the barn watching our riders in action. Her involvement with Pony Club and CADORA (Dressage) also goes back many years.

2013 RIDER OF THE YEAR CITATION FOR KENNETH STEWART

In 1994, a young lad joined our program. This was Kenneth Stewart, the recipient of the Joyriders 2013 Rider of the Year award.

We have been privileged to watch this rider grow and mature from a boy to a teen to an adult — and he rides with us still. Over the past 19 years, Kenneth has worked hard to overcome obstacles and to constantly improve. As a result, he has become one of our senior riders with much experience now tucked under his belt.

In addition to participating in our spring and fall riding sessions, Kenneth has been involved in a number of riding competitions and demonstrations, both in this province and on the mainland. He was

* a member of the 1995 PEI Team at the Atlantic Coast Games for the Disabled held in Nova Scotia, winning ribbons in Equitation, Trail, and Mounted Games.

* a member of the 1999 PEI Team at the Atlantic Coast Games, helping to win the Hi Point Team trophy

* a member of the 2001 PEI Team at the Atlantic Coast Games, winning ribbons in Dressage, Trail, and Mounted Games

* a participant in the 2002 and 2006 Joyriders Open House riding demonstrations at our home base in Winsloe. At one of these events, he acted as guest judge.

Additionally, in the past two years, Kenneth has participated in Para-Equestrian Canada's Coast to Coast national video competition, entering the Trail class for his category, and is currently training for the Equitation class in the next competition.

Kenneth has shown great dedication to the Joyriders program. He arrives promptly for his lessons and rarely misses any. He is always keen. His friendly and cheerful disposition is enjoyed by his peers and volunteer helpers. In fact, he has been a great volunteer recruiter. His sister Amanda volunteered with the program for several years, and his dad Allan has trained as a

volunteer to step in when needed. Kenneth knows that the support of his family has played an important role in his success at riding.

Like many of us, Kenneth has had to face the challenge of weight gain, but more so for him as vigorous exercise like jogging is not an option. When his weight has surpassed the limit allowed to ensure the comfort and safety of the therapy horses, he has taken a leave of absence and the bull by the horns. He has worked hard to return to the program, suitably slimmed down, and moved forward again with his riding. You have to admire a guy who has gone to the lengths of refusing birthday cake in order to lose weight so he can get back to riding.

We congratulate Kenneth on this award. It represents our recognition and admiration of everything he has put into his participation in the Joyriders over the many years he has been involved.


